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Principal's Report



Last Wednesday, **Mrs Ridley** and I joined school leaders from across the region in Tamworth to learn more at the Student Behaviour Policy Roadshow. Yesterday afternoon, our teachers spent some time looking at some of the changes to the policy and the care continuum with our Learning and Wellbeing Coordinator, **Mrs Hopwood**.

The NSW Department of Education is introducing a revised Student Behaviour Policy and new Suspension and Expulsion Procedures from Term 1, 2024.

The policy and procedures support an inclusive and safe learning environment for your child, staff and every child in NSW public schools.

With the revisions to the policy, we now have clarity and consistency for how we manage disruptive and challenging student behaviour in the classroom, so our teachers can teach, and our students can learn.

The guidelines allow us to work closer together with you to support your child to behave positively and respectfully, and develop individual plans with clear expectations, so they can achieve their best.

We have many practices in place to help our students engage respectfully with each other and their learning. You can find out more about these and advice and support strategies to help you work with us to achieve positive outcomes for your child through the department's Behaviour Support Toolkit.

Violence in our schools is never acceptable. Suspension is a critical safeguard for ensuring the safety of our students, teachers and staff.

You can read a preview of the policy and procedures on the department website.

The staff and I are reviewing our current approach in line with the revised policy and procedures and will share any changes we believe need to be made with you from Term 1 2024.

Parents and carers play an important role in the school community. We will continue to engage and communicate with you around our School Behaviour Support and Management Plan, that outlines our school processes and practices moving forward.

Our school already takes a strong, positive, student-centered approach, and we look forward to continuing to work closely with you and all our families to maintain a safe learning environment so our students can thrive.

Orientation

Our 2024 Kindergarten students came to 'big school' today for the last day of orientation to Armidale City Public School. If you are yet to complete an enrolment for your child in 2024, please contact the office on 6772 3420 for more information. Enrolment can be completed online.

Year 6 students who have returned enrolment forms for Armidale Secondary College will be involved in a day of orientation tomorrow. If you have not completed enrolment forms, please do so as a matter of urgency so your child doesn't miss out. Contact the office if you require a new form.

Selective High School application – closing soon.

If you are a parent of a Year 5 student and would like to have your child considered for Year 7 selective high school entry in 2025, you need to apply on the internet by next Monday, 20 November 2023 using a valid email address (not the student's email address). World Children's Day - the importance of play and letting kids be kids

Bob Ross had a career in the Air Force for 20 years and didn't start painting until he retired. At 41, he became everyone's favourite art teacher.

Colonel Sanders had a hard time holding down jobs, working as a fireman, insurance salesman, and even worked in law, It wasn't until his 40s that he started successfully selling fried chicken.

Martha Stewart worked as a stockbroker. It wasn't until she was 41 that she published her first cookbook. Albert Einstein was expelled from his school, and his teachers thought that he was mentally handicapped. Yet

he went on to win a Nobel Prize and is considered one of the most brilliant minds of all time. Winston Churchill failed 6th grade. At 63, he became Prime Minister of England.

It's so easy to grow anxious, worried that our children are falling behind or missing out.

We worry that they won't develop their culinary skills if they don't start Mummy and Me cooking classes as toddlers.

We fear that they will never be talented artists if we don't enrol them in the pricey after school art class.

We are concerned that if we don't require them to practice piano daily, they will never develop into talented musicians.

We worry that their low score on their maths test means that they will never go into a STEM course at university.

We anxiously watch on as they struggle to decide which subjects to pursue in high school, worried what careers they are precluding themselves from following.

What we often fail to remember in those moments of anxiety and fear, is that learning doesn't stop when they finish high school or their tertiary education. As adults we can go back at any time and learn to paint, learn to do complex algebra, learn to be good leaders. We can change career paths again and again, and quickly catch up on the things we missed or have forgotten.

What we can't do is get our childhoods back.

Childhood isn't a time to prepare to be an adult.

Childhood is a time to be a child.

Childhood is a special time where imaginative play feels richer, where friendships are formed over a shared love of digging for worms, and where building a tree house can feel like the most important thing in the world.

Yet we often cut into that time to get them to sit still, learn 'important things', and prepare for their futures. The problem is that the more time that they are engaged in adult-leid, structured, future-oriented activities, the less time they have available to engage in the real work of childhood – play.

Play teaches our kids everything that they really need to learn. It fosters physical and motor development. Play requires socio-emotional skills. It strengthens the imagination and creativity. It builds STEM skills and deductive reasoning. Play can not be substituted with other activities and still achieve the same outcomes. Children need the opportunity to play.

To celebrate World Children's Day, let's elevate play to it's true level of importance. Let's prioritise it above our own goals for our children. Let's allow our kids to have a day, at least just this one day, to choose their own activities, to play without direction, to engage in the work of childhood without limits.

And if you can, go even further. Start a 30 day play challenge, making sure your kids have at least 45 minutes every day to engage in activities of their own choice.

If it's been a while since they had the opportunity for free play, they might not know where to begin. To avoid those calls of "I'm bored", try setting the stage with these play prompts:

- Pull out the bicycles
- Visit a new playground
- Set up a play dough or clay station
 Get out the chalk
- Get out the chaik
 Turn the hose into a sprinkler
- Go to the beach
- ▶ Take a few different balls to a park
- Dust off some board games
- ▶ Go to the swimming pool
- Figure Get out the paints and paint brushes
- Go out to a nature reserve
- Visit some rock pools

Then get out of the way. True play is self-directed, intrinsically motivated, and creative.


This World Children's Day (and hopefully every day) let's safeguard childhood, value play, and let our kids be kids.

PRESENTATION DAY AWARDS

Our school has very clear guidelines and well planned timetables for the organization of awards at the end of the year. This ensures that awards are made fairly and with due consideration. *Please encourage your child to read the criteria for awards for which he/she may be eligible and submit their achievements by 17 November 2023 to avoid disappointment*.

1. THE PROFESSOR C. HILL MEMORIAL AWARD FOR PERFORMING ARTS.

This will be awarded to one student, who need not necessarily be a Year 6 student, for excellence in Performing Arts.

Performing Arts may include instrumental music, singing, drama, dance, speaking or the writing of items to be performed which may include music, song and literature. Only performances at school or representing the school shall be considered.

A list of achievements is to be compiled by candidates for the award prior to a meeting of the staff who shall determine the award. The award is a trophy and School Merit Certificate presented at Presentation Day.

2. JOANN GRIFFITHS AWARD FOR MUSICAL EXCELLENCE

This will be awarded to one student, who need not necessarily be a Year 6 student, for excellence and a high standard of achievement in Music. Performances in examinations, eisteddfods, district festivals and school activities shall be considered.

A list of current achievements is to be compiled by candidates for the award prior to a meeting of the staff who shall determine the award. The awards will be determined in consultation with music teachers. The award is an individual trophy and a School Merit Certificate presented at Presentation Day.

School Student Travel for 2024 (bus passes)



Applications for bus passes in 2024 are now open. Depending on where you are travelling, you may receive a free school travel pass. Students in kindergarten, Year 1 and Year 2 and student's living more than 2.3km (walking distance) from school can apply for free travel.

You only need to apply for a pass if: you are applying for the first time; your child is moving from year 2 into year 3; or requesting additional passes due to parents living separately.

Please ensure your details are up to date at school so approval can be done quickly.

2024 school travel applications are now open

Students who need a new or replacement School Opal card or travel pass for 2024 can <u>apply</u> now. A new application will need to be submitted if they are applying for the first time, or if they are requesting an additional travel entitlement because of a new shared parental arrangement (e.g. joint custody).

(ag. joint custody). Students who change address, school, campus location, have repeated a year or received an expiry notification for their school travel entitlement should <u>renew or update</u> their details <u>before</u> the end of term 4. This will ensure that schools can endorse applications, and travel passes remain valid for the start of the 2024 school year. School Opal card holders will have the changes applied to their existing card.

If a student's distance eligibility has changed based on their grade (i.e. grade two to grade three), the system will automatically update their entitlement if they meet the new criteria. If they do not meet the new <u>eligibility criteria</u>, we will send an expiry notification via email.

Students who have an entitlement approved under a medical condition that is due to expire will receive a notification advising them to re-apply.

Term Bus Pass holders will receive a notification to re-apply.

Students in the Opal network applying for an Opal card (including a Term Bus Pass) for the first time will receive their Student Opal card at their nominated postal address. Cards will be mailed out from January 2024.

Students living in rural and regional (R&R) areas should receive their travel pass at the start of the new school year from their nominated transport operator. It may come via the school or be sent directly to them at home. **Note:** some R&R operators do not issue travel passes. Students/parents should confirm with their nominated operator if they do not receive a pass.

Changes to your bus service provider

Within Greater Sydney, a number of bus service providers have changed their names.

Parents intending to lodge an application for a School Opal card will need to visit <u>transportnsw.info</u> <u>trip planner</u> to obtain the correct bus operator name servicing your area prior to lodging an application.

Travel from Term 12024

We ask that parents plan ahead and make sure their child knows which service/s to use and has a valid ticket to travel; either a School Opal card or Child/Youth Opal card (within Greater Sydney) or a School Travel Pass (outside Greater Sydney), from the start of the school year. OFFICIAL

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School Student Travel Term 4 2023

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Applications for 2024 School Student Transport Scheme (SSTS) travel open at the start of Term 4 2023, so parents/students can <u>apply</u> or <u>update</u> details early and be ready for the start of the new school year.

Most students using the Opal network will not need a new Opal card and can continue travelling on their existing card each year.

The start of the year is a busy period for local transport operators, and students travelling without a valid ticket make service planning and operations difficult.

Whithout a value ducket makes are not planning and operations distributed. We recognise that for some families last multice changes to school enrolments mean they may not have a School Opal card or Travel Pass for the start of term. In the Opal network, we strongly encourage these families to have their children travel with a Child/Youth Opal card until they receive their valid School Opal card. If outside Greater Sydney, parents should contact their <u>local</u> <u>bus operator</u> to discuss their travel needs.

Bus operators are flexible and understanding, particularly at the start of the school year, and will ensure students can travel safely to and from school. But to best support our operators we encourage all students to have a valid ticket, as early as possible, from the start of the school year.

Students using School Opal cards are also reminded that they must tap on and tap off in line with the <u>Student code of conduct</u> and <u>Opal terms of use</u>.


